Disability Support Services & ADA Compliance

In accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the University offers reasonable accommodations to students with eligible documented learning, physical, and/or psychological disabilities. Under Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and the Americans with Disabilities Amendment Act of 2008, a disability is defined as a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities as compared to an average person in the population. It is the responsibility of the student to contact Disability Support Services to initiate the process to develop an accommodation plan. This accommodation plan will not be applied retroactively. Appropriate, reasonable accommodations will be made to allow each student to meet course requirements, but no fundamental or substantial alteration of academic standards will be made. Military & Veterans Service Center

The Military & Veterans Service Center was established in 2016 to better serve Military-Connected Student Veterans and Dependents. The purpose of Military and Veterans Service Center at UNA is to assist veterans, active-duty military, National Guards, and Reservists and their family members in taking full advantage of the educational benefits available to them through the GI Bill, Federal Tuition Assistance, and other programs. The Center is staffed with 1 full-time VA Certifying Official within the Registrar's Office in the Wendell W. Gunn University Commons Building and up to 5 Student Veterans utilizing Federal VA work-study funding. The Center is located in the Guillot University Center and was initially designed to provide Student Veterans with a relaxing and friendly safe-haven, where they can congregate with their peers as they integrate into University life. In support of the integration, the center welcomes all students, faculty, and staff to utilize the facility regardless of any military or veteran experiences. The ultimate goal is the advancement of the common good and to support education, research, community, and advocacy by working with Student Veterans and dependents. The center houses the student lounge, computer lab, and study and meeting area. The Division of Student Affairs assists with programming support and student development initiatives through co-curricular experiences and resources and support with the Student Veterans of America student organization.

Student Activities and Programming

The University provides diverse programming for students, staff, and faculty featuring noted lecturers, artists, and actors. Recitals, plays, art exhibitions, and concerts are provided through the fine arts departments and the Student Government Association. Student Engagement, Student Government, and the University Program Council collaborate to celebrate traditions, host campus competitions, and plan exciting events including the Miss UNA Pageant, Spring Concert, Step Sing, Homecoming, and Mane Month. University Center Operations and Event Management

University Health Services

University Health Services (UHS) is an acute-care medical clinic and is designed to meet the basic healthcare needs of UNA students and employees. Services available include treatment of short-term illnesses and minor injuries, basic physical exams, allergy injections, select immunizations and vaccines, wellness screenings, and health education offerings. The clinic is staffed with full-time administrative staff, board-certified nurse practitioners, registered nurses, and a contract physician who serves as the medical director of the clinic. Any UNA student can access services at the clinic or via telehealth and can see a provider at no charge. Students may be offered medications, lab tests, and other medical supplies for an additional cost. On the Patient Portal, students can submit immunization requirements, upload records, access class excuses, and view lab work and patient education. University Police

The University's Police Department (UPD) is committed to providing a safe and secure environment for its faculty, staff, students, and guests. In addition to law enforcement and community education, the UPD is responsible for Transportation Services, the Student Nighttime Auxiliary Patrol (SNAP), which provides safe, nighttime transportation on campus
